Grading Policy, Methods of Assessment	Elements of final grade: All assignments, tests, activities will be graded on a standard five-tiered (1-5) scale.  Weighting of Assignments and Testing: Active and informed participation in seminar work – 10% Presentation of a given topic (10-15 min.) – 10% Mini tests – 10% Module test – 20% Final exam – 50% (The course will be completed with an oral exam) The exam comprises 50% of the final grade
Course Policy	Grading scale: 0-59 fail, 60-74 pass, 75-89 good, 90-100 excellent  Students are required to attend lectures and seminars regularly and they are expected to be active participants of both the lectures and seminars. The extent and the quality of class participation will be taken into consideration for the final grade.  Reading the assigned texts. Students are required to come prepared for class: they must be able to understand the texts (know the words), remember details, and formulate their critical comments. Not reading the assignment for a class counts as an absence.  Students are expected to complete all homework independently (unless otherwise required). Working together for anything other than group work and/or plagiarising published research is considered cheating.  Students are allowed to take the final exam in January if they have successfully passed the module tests.  Students have to pay close attention to deadlines.
