Review of master's degree program "History and Archaeology" of the Ferenc Rákóczi II Transcarpathian Hungarian College of Higher Education

The master's degree program titled "History and Archaeology" offered by the Department of History and Social Sciences of the Ferenc Rákóczi II Transcarpathian Hungarian College meets modern academic and professional standards and demonstrates clear alignment with both national and international expectations in higher education. The program's concept is built upon a solid foundation of theoretical and methodological instruction and includes practical training in both archival and archaeological research.

Moreover, the implementation of quality assurance mechanisms and the institutional commitment to academic integrity (e.g., the use of plagiarism detection systems, transparent assessment criteria) further enhances the credibility and effectiveness of the program. The availability of rich library resources, digital repositories, and modern information technologies provides strong infrastructural support.
